





Brief details on the history of your library buildings.

Year (first) library building opened	The National Library of Serbia was founded in 1832, as the first cultural institution in Serbia. At first (1832-1833) it was placed in a bookshop near the Cathedral in Belgrade, and it was soon transferred to the building of the State Printing House in close vicinity.
Architect of (first) library building	/
Year (current) library building opened	The current building of the National Library of Serbia is practically the first purpose-built library after a long line of buildings that "merely hosted" the Library.
Architect of (current) library building	The architect of the current library building was Professor Ivo Kurtović (1910-1972).
	The foundation of the current library building was laid in October 1966. The works lasted till November 1972, and the building was officially opened on 6 April 1973 (which also had a symbolic meaning, since on that day, in 1941, the Library was burnt to the ground and its complete holdings were
