

1. Life after Covid

with Hans Petschar, National Library of Austria

Covid-19 is transforming how we work, the way we collaborate with others, and the way we combine the physical and digital worlds to make national libraries' collections available. You will explore in this session with Hans Petschar what life after Covid might look like for staff, users and our services.

2. Contested histories and inclusive voices

with Beba Stankovic, National Library of Serbia

The National Library of Serbia was recently awarded a CENL Hidden Stories grant for a project to record and preserve women's experiences of the pandemic. As part of 'Collection Days' women will be invited to share stories of their lives during the pandemic, especially those working on the front lines. In this session with Beba Stankovic, you will explore how national

libraries can create ways to include different voices in our collections and programming, and to explore contested histories in our national collections – we will share ideas and experiences together, as this topic becomes increasingly important for national libraries.

3. How FAIR is your National Library data? with Sally Chambers and Ann Van Camp, KBR

The increasing digitisation of society and resulting increased digitisation of library collections results in National Libraries needing to develop processes to manage an insurmountable amount of diverse document and data types (e.g. bibliographic data, authority data, digital data, collections as data, born-digital data, e-resources data, research data and labs data). In practice, this entails making our National Libraries' data FAIR (Findable, Accessible, Interoperable and Reusable). In this session we will introduce the FAIR Principles and explore their benefits, challenges and opportunities for National Libraries through the practical example of Linked Open Data (LOD) and ISNI (International Standard Name Identifiers).

Host



SARA LAMMENS General Director a.i., KBR

Sara Lammens studied Musicology and Philosophical academy at the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven. She started her professional career as a researcher at the Alamire Foundation, the international centre for the study of music in the Low Countries. In 2004 Sara began working for the Royal Library of Belgium (KBR), where she replaced the Head of the Music Department for a few months. Sara then switched over to the Communications Department, first as an employee, later as Head of Communications. In 2013 she became the Support Services Director of KBR and was responsible for managing and coordinating Budget and Finances, Facilities, Human Resources, ICT, Prevention and Well-Being. She also took the Digitisation and Public Services under her wing.

Since 1st May 2017 she has been the General Director a.i. of KBR, responsible for the general management of the institution and its representation in Belgium and abroad.

Keynote Speaker



Dr. CARLA HAYDEN Librarian of Congress , Library of Congress

Dr. Carla Hayden was sworn in as the 14th Librarian of Congress on September 14, 2016. Hayden, the first woman and the first African American to lead the national library, was nominated to the position by President Barack Obama on February 24, 2016, and her nomination was confirmed by the U.S. Senate on July 13.

Prior to her latest post she served, since 1993, as CEO of the Enoch Pratt Free Library in Baltimore, Maryland. Hayden was nominated by President Obama to be a member of the National Museum and Library Services Board in January 2010 and was confirmed to that post by the Senate in June 2010. Prior to joining the Pratt Library, Hayden was deputy commissioner and chief librarian of the Chicago Public Library

from 1991 to 1993. She was an assistant professor for Library and Information Science at the University of Pittsburgh from 1987 to 1991. Hayden was library services coordinator for the Museum of Science and Industry in Chicago from 1982 to 1987. She began her career with the Chicago Public Library as the young adult services coordinator from 1979 to 1982 and as a library associate and children's librarian from 1973 to 1979.

Hayden was president of the American Library Association from 2003 to 2004. In 1995, she was the first African American to receive Library Journal's Librarian of the Year Award in recognition of her outreach services at the Pratt Library, which included an after-school center for Baltimore teens offering homework assistance and college and career counseling. Hayden received a B.A. from Roosevelt University and an M.A. and P.D. from the Graduate Library School of the University of Chicago.

Speakers



ANTHONY AGOTHA

Senior diplomatic advisor to the Executive Vice President of the European Green Deal, European Commission

Tony Agotha is a Dutch diplomat since 1996 who served amongst others as deputy director of European Integration in the Foreign Ministry, spokesman in the Permanent Representation to the EU in Brussels, national expert in the Turkey Team of the European Commission, deputy ambassador in Ljubljana, first secretary in the Permanent Representation to the EU, and member of the Office of the Secretary-General at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He is currently senior diplomatic advisor to the Executive Vice President of the European Green Deal Mr. Frans Timmermans at the European Commission in Brussels. He studied Public Administration/Political Science at the University of Twente (1995) and wrote his Masters' thesis at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (NC) as a visiting scholar. Tony Agotha is married and has four children; he loves baseball, running, reading, and cooking.



LORENA ALDANA

European Policy Coordinator, Europa Nostra

Lorena Aldana is a heritage professional from Mexico. She is the European Policy Coordinator at Europa Nostra, the largest and most representative umbrella organisation for heritage NGOs in Europe. In this role, she coordinates Europa Nostra's work in the field of EU heritage policy and advocacy. She also coordinates the participation of the organisation in different EU-funded heritage projects.

Previously, she was part of the task force charged with implementing the European Year of Cultural Heritage 2018 in the European Commission, Directorate General for Education and Culture (DG EAC). As such, she worked on the design, management and communication of the Year's activities at EU level.

In the past, she also worked for the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), in the research and design of heritage-led local development strategies. She has participated as speaker and panelist in manifold international conferences.

She holds a Masters Degree in Cultural Economics and Management (University of Bologna, Italy), a Bachelor's Degree in International Affairs (ITESM, Mexico) and a Certificate in Political Science (Science Po Toulouse, France).



Prof. IVANKA STRIČEVIĆ, PhD

Director General, National and University Library in Zagreb

Ivanka Stričević has been University Professor since 2007 and in 2020 she was appointed as a Director General of the National and University Library in Zagreb and still teaches at the University of Zadar and mentors doctoral students. She graduated in pedagogy and librarianship, obtained a MA degree in pedagogy, and a PhD degree in information and communication sciences, all from the University of Zagreb, Croatia.

In her academic career she carried several management positions. She was Vice Rector for Scientific Affairs and Information Infrastructure at the University of Zadar (2015-2019) and Head of Department of Information Sciences at the University of Zadar (2012-2015). Before starting her academic career, Ivanka Stričević was a Manager of youth services in the Public Library in Zagreb (1978-2007).

She is active member of international conferences' program committees and of national and international professional associations, including the Croatian Library Association and Croatian Reading Association. As an active member of IFLA (International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions) she was chair of the IFLA Libraries for Children and Young Adults Section and IFLA Literacy and Reading Section and she is currently participating in the National Libraries Section. She was a member of the Working Group of the Ministry of Culture and Media of the Republic of Croatia, charged to create the National Strategy for the Promotion of Reading. On the basis of the Strategy the Government of the Republic of Croatia declared the year 2021 the Year of Reading.

She published more than 70 papers, co-authored 10 studies and books, edited numerous publications on users of information, reading, literacy and librarianship, worked on scientific and numerous expert projects and participated in panels about reading, literacy and librarianship. She received two national awards for achievements in education in 1994 and for achievements in librarianship in 2008.



JULIA KONOPKA-ZOLNIERCZUK
Deputy Director, National Library of Poland

Julia Konopka-Żolnierczuk holds a degree in Cultural Studies, specialising in Mediterranean civilisation, from the Faculty of "Artes Liberales" at the University of Warsaw. She has worked at the National Library of Poland since January 2016, first in the Secretariat and then combining the positions of Secretary to the Management and Head of the Secretariat. Her position has brought her responsibility for the coordination of several projects at the National Library.

Since 2017 she has acted as representative of the Director of the National Library with regard to purchases and donations of library materials. On behalf of the National Library, she helped prepare the National Reading Development Programme for 2021-2025. In 2021, she was appointed Deputy Director of the National Library of Poland responsible for international cooperation.



LAURENCE ENGEL

President, Bibliothèque nationale de France

Born in 1966, Laurence Engel was appointed President of the National Library of France and took up her post on April 11, 2016.

A graduate of ENS (Ecole Normale Supérieure) Fontenay-aux-Roses, IEP (Institut d'Etudes Politiques) and ENA (Ecole Nationale d'Administration), she is a member of the Cour des Comptes (French Court of Audit).

After joining Jérôme Clément, President of ARTE, a public Franco-German TV network that promotes programming in the areas of culture and the arts and later on the public television network "La Cinquième" in 1998, she was appointed Adviser on Audiovisual Matters to Catherine Tasca, then Minister of Culture and Communication, in the period 2000 to 2002. She was Cultural Advisor to Mayor of Paris Bertrand Delanoë, in the period 2003 to 2008 and afterwards Director of Cultural Affairs for the City of Paris until 2012.

She acted as Director of the Cabinet Office of Aurélie Filippetti, then Minister of Culture and Communication, for the period 2012-2014. Consequently, she joined the Cour des Comptes and was, furthermore, appointed as Ombudsman for the Book. During that period of time, Laurence Engel acted also as Chair of the Board of Directors of INHA (Institut National de l'Histoire de l'Art) and Chair of the Finance Commission of the AFP (Agence France Presse).

She has published various books and articles, in particular about Cultural policy, for the French literary magazine *Esprit*.



COVID-SAFE APP



You will need to show the CovidSafeBe application or your EU Digital Covid Certificate to enter into the Royal Library of Belgium.



Who needs the app?

- **If you have an EU Digital Covid Certificate from another EU Member State**, all you need to do is have your certificate in your own country's app or on paper scanned at the entrance.

Certificates from the following countries are also valid in Belgium: Iceland, Liechtenstein, San Marino, Switzerland, United Kingdom, Scotland, Wales, Vatican City, Albania, Andorra, Monaco, North Macedonia, Turkey, Ukraine, Armenia.

- **If you don't have an EU Digital Covid Certificate from another Member State**, then you need to get tested in Belgium to obtain a certificate which you will be able to upload on the CovidSafeBe app. Testing can be a PCR test or a RAT (Rapid Antigen Test). A PCR test is valid for 72 hours, so **we recommend doing a PCR test**. A RAT test is valid on the day of testing and the day after testing. A RAT test takes approximately 20 minutes until you have the result and can be taken at a local pharmacist. The list of pharmacies where you can take a RAT test is available here:

How do I get the app?

You will need to download the official CovidSafeBE app on your mobile device. You will find all the information about the app on <https://covidsafe.be/en/> The app is available in English, French and Dutch.

What do I need to do once I've downloaded the app?

You will need to upload your Covid safe certificate. There are three types of certificates: a vaccination certificate, a test certificate or a recovery certificate. In your case, this will be a test certificate.

- To get your test certificate, get tested at a testing centre (see details in FAQ).
- You must provide a phone number and you may be asked to provide an email address as well.
- A Covid-19 Test Prescription Code (CTPC) is then sent in a text message and possibly also by email.
- When you receive your negative result, you can use this CTPC code and your phone number to download your EU Digital Covid Certificate in the CovidSafeBE app. If you don't have a smartphone, you can download the certificate on mijngezondheid.be or masanté.be

FAQ

➤ What are the travel rules to Belgium?

Since 1 July 2021, you can travel to Belgium if you have been fully vaccinated.

'Fully vaccinated' means vaccinated with a vaccine approved by the European Medicines Agency (EMA) and for which all doses of the vaccine provided for in the leaflet have been administered at least two weeks before travelling.

At the time of writing, Belgium accepts the following four vaccines for entry:

1. Moderna (mRNA-1273)
2. Pfizer/BioNTech (BNT162b2)
3. Johnson & Johnson (Ad26.COV2.S)
4. Oxford/AstraZeneca (AZD1222)

A 'recognised vaccination certificate' means the EU Digital COVID Certificate. Certificates from the following countries are also valid in Belgium: Iceland, Liechtenstein, San Marino, Switzerland, United Kingdom, Scotland, Wales, Vatican City, Albania, Andorra, Monaco, North Macedonia, Turkey, Ukraine, Armenia.

Since 1 February 2021, **Belgium is using a colour code system**. For countries within the European Union/European Economic Area, the colour codes are aligned with those of the [European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control \(ECDC\)](https://www.ecdc.europa.eu/en). Third countries are considered to be red zones, with the exception of the countries listed on the website: <https://www.info-coronavirus.be/en> for which the travel restrictions have temporarily been lifted.

The Belgian approach for people arriving in Belgium depends on whether they are returning from a red, orange or green zone. Depending on the country or region you are travelling from, different measures apply after your arrive in Belgium.

All passengers must complete the [Public Health Passenger Locator Form \(PLF\)](#) in the 48 hours before their arrival in Belgium, even if they're vaccinated and provide a COVID certificate (vaccination certificate, recovery certificate or test certificate).

- Passengers travelling from a **green** or **orange zone** You do not need to get tested or quarantine.

- Passengers travelling from a **red zone in the European Union**

If you have a vaccination or recovery certificate, you do not need to quarantine or get tested.

If not, you must do a PCR test a maximum of 72 hours before you arrive in Belgium or a RAT test the day before arrival or the day of arrival. This test must be negative. On arrival in Belgium, you do not have to go into quarantine.

- Passengers travelling from a **red zone outside the European Union**

If you are vaccinated, get tested (PCR or RAT) on day 1 or 2 after you arrive in Belgium.

You have to stay in quarantine until the negative result of your test.

If not vaccinated, you must quarantine for 10 days and get tested on day 1 or 7.

Testing in the context of travelling can be a PCR test or a RAT (Rapid Antigen Test). A RAT test takes approximately 20 minutes until you have the result and can be taken at a local pharmacist. The list of pharmacies where you can take a RAT test is available online [here](#).

- In addition to the colour coding system, there are also special measures relating to the territory of countries classified as very high risk, the so-called 'very high-risk countries'. In this case, visitors are not allowed to travel to Belgium.

I am visiting from a red zone outside the European Union, how can I get tested on arrival in Belgium?

At the airport:

- Rapid Antigen Test:

Testing in the context of travelling can be a PCR test or a RAT (Rapid Antigen Test). A RAT test takes approximately 20 minutes until you have the result and can be taken at a local pharmacist. The list of pharmacies where you can take a RAT test is available online [here](#).

- PCR test:

Arriving passengers will receive a text message on their mobile with a code to be tested based on the information you provided in your Passenger Locator Form before flying to Belgium.

If you are an arriving passenger with a 16 character test code (received via SMS) based on the information you entered on your Passenger Locator Form (é-PLF) you will pay € 40.44 for a standard PCR test if you have the code but are not affiliated with a Belgian health insurance.

You can pay with different payment methods, when registering online or on

site. We advise you to pay in advance as much as possible to avoid queues. Online or on-site registration are available (online registration is strongly recommended)

For arriving passengers, results are available 24 to 48 hours after completion of the test. All test results are sent to you by e-mail.

At Brussels-Midi or in town on arrival:

- Rapid Antigen Test:

Testing in the context of travelling can be a PCR test or a RAT (Rapid Antigen Test). A RAT test takes approximately 20 minutes until you have the result and can be taken at a local pharmacist. The list of pharmacies where you can take a RAT test is available online [here](#).

- PCR test:

Arriving passengers will receive a text message on their mobile with a code to be tested based on the information you provided in your Passenger Locator Form before arriving to Belgium.

Paid PCR test cost € 41 with a result within 48 hours via SMS or coronalert app.

The Brussels Test Centers operate by appointment. There is a test centre in Brussels Midi station. You can book your appointment via this link:

Can I quarantine at the Ibis Hotel?

Yes if you get tested immediately on arrival, you can then travel to the Ibis hotel and quarantine there until your negative result.

I need to get tested to go back to my country. Where can I get tested?

For passengers departing from the airport:

You can either book:

- Standard PCR test, €55, results available within 24 hours
- Rapid PCR test, €120, if the test is carried out between 6 a.m. and 8 p.m., you will have to wait 3 hours to get your result
- Antigenic test, €55, results available in 50 minutes

Will financial assistance be available for travel costs?

As agreed at the CENL Annual Meeting 2006 in St Petersburg, financial assistance can be provided for a selection of CENL members to attend the annual general meeting. Because of the short window to book flights to Brussels, which might be more expensive by this point, the Executive Committee has decided, exceptionally and for this year only, to extend the list of eligible members to ensure that more members are able to afford the travel costs to attend the AGM.

Members who pay a membership fee between €750-2000 will all be eligible for a travel bursary of up to a maximum of €1,000 in relation to actual travel and accommodation costs. The Executive Committee has also agreed to extend the claimable costs to Covid-19 testing costs.

If you are eligible for financial assistance, you will have received a personal email with the details on how to apply within the next 48h hours. If you haven't been contacted by Monday 27th September and think that you are eligible, please contact us at cenl@bl.uk.

 **Do I need the CovidSafeBe application?**
You will need to show the Covid-Safe Be application or your EU Digital Covid Certificate to enter into the Royal Library of Belgium.

If you have an EU Digital Covid Certificate from another EU Member State, all you need to do is have your certificate scanned at the entrance in your own country's app or on paper. **Certificates from the following countries are also valid** in Belgium: Iceland, Liechtenstein, San Marino, Switzerland, United Kingdom, Scotland, Wales, Vatican City, Albania, Andorra, Monaco, North Macedonia, Turkey, Ukraine, Armenia.

If you don't have an EU Digital Covid Certificate from another Member State, then you need to get tested in Belgium to obtain a certificate which you will be able to upload on the CovidSafeBe app. Testing can be a PCR test or a RAT (Rapid Antigen Test). A PCR test is valid for 72 hours. A RAT test is valid the day of testing and the day after testing. A RAT test takes approximately 20 minutes until you have the result and can be taken at a local pharmacist. The list of pharmacies where you can take a RAT test is available online [here](#).

 **What Covid-19 measures will you be following during the AGM?**

We will be following social distancing measures while indoor including in the rooms hosting the meetings. We will be asking everyone to wear a face covering while they are indoors. This excludes people who cannot put on, wear or remove a face covering because of a physical or mental illness or impairment, or disability.

Should you be unable to join us in Brussels, you may nominate a representative from your own library to attend the AGM and vote on your behalf. Alternatively, you may nominate another CENL member to vote on your behalf. In both cases, you will need to fill in a proxy form to nominate your representative. 




Ibis Hotel to National Library






